For anyone wondering, the Legion will be operating under the 1/3 rule so including vendors, upwards of 200 people can be in the building at any one time. While the facility will be under the 1/3 rule, we are still asking shoppers to wear masks and to social distance to the best of their abilities.

Christmas In the Park – as an outdoor event, we have a little more leeway here as we invite the town to come down to Woodland Park Thursday 25 November from 6 – 8 p.m. for hot chocolate, cookies, hopefully some arts & crafts for the kids, and sleigh rides. This event will, of course be dependent on the weather so check out the Town's Facebook page and website if the weather is iffy for any last-minute decision to cancel or proceed with the event.

First Night – okay, worst case scenario, First Night will just be fireworks like in 2020. IF Covid guidelines permit it, we will try to have a normal event that will include indoor public skating, free hot chocolate, and hot dogs, and hopefully some kid's entertainment. Again, depending on what the restrictions are at that time, we might be able to do the skating but not the hot chocolate and hot dogs. Please watch the Town's Facebook page and website for updates and details. But no matter what, there will be fireworks.

Benefits of Composting

Reduces the Waste Stream

Composting is a great way to recycle the organic waste we generate at home. Food scraps and garden waste combined make up more than 28 percent of what we throw away. Not only is food waste a significant burden on the environment, but processing it is costly. Composting at home allows us to divert waste from landfills and turn it into something practical for our yards.

Cuts Methane Emissions from Landfills

Typically when organic matter decomposes, it undergoes aerobic decomposition, meaning that it's broken down by microorganisms that require oxygen. When compostable waste goes to a landfill, it gets buried under massive amounts of other trash, cutting off a regular supply of oxygen for the decomposers. The waste then ends up undergoing anaerobic decomposition, being broken down by organisms that can live without free-flowing oxygen. During anaerobic decomposition, biogas is created as a by-product. This biogas is roughly 50 percent methane and 50 percent carbon dioxide, both of which are potent greenhouse gases, with methane being 28 to 36 times more effective than CO₂ at trapping heat in the atmosphere over a century

Improves Soil Health and Lessens Erosion

Compost is an essential tool for improving large-scale agricultural systems. Compost contains three primary nutrients needed by garden crops: nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. It also includes traces of other essential elements like calcium, magnesium, iron, and zinc. Instead of relying on synthetic fertilizers that contain harmful chemicals, composting offers an organic alternative. Research has shown the capability of compost to increase soil's water retention capacity, productivity, and resiliency.

Conserves Water

Research has shown the water-retaining capacities of soil increase with the addition of organic matter. In fact, each 1 percent increase in soil organic matter helps soil hold 20,000 gallons more water per acre. By using compost to foster healthy soil, farmers do not have to use as much water and can still have higher yields compared with farming with degraded soil.

Reduces Personal Food Waste

Even if we do everything possible to decrease food waste, there will still be food scraps that cannot be consumed (e.g., a banana peel). Composting is a great way to recycle those discards instead of tossing them in the trash.

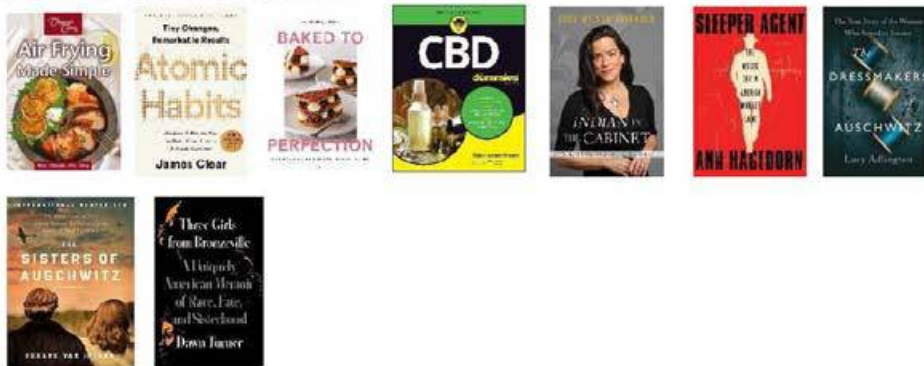
