### **Mayor's Corner**

Happy New Year Everyone! I hope everyone enjoyed this Christmas season. It is always a busy time for my family and I and we wish you all the very best in 2019. I feel it is always important to discuss where we have been and what we have accomplished as we head into the new year. With that in mind, I am happy to discuss the following accomplishments.

At the Mike Karbonik Arena we installed new washrooms, showers, exterior cladding and an ice condenser for the ice plant. This concludes many upgrades to the arena in the past 2 years. The Library received a new front vestibule, which makes the library warmer, the doors are handicap accessible and adds great curb appeal to the Town. On 50<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 52<sup>nd</sup> street, the Town added crosswalk lights so that our children have safe passage across the highway. In 2019 we will be installing another set of crosswalk lights at 50<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Westview Drive. New curbs, sidewalks and pavement were replaced on Parkview Crescent with the work being completed in 2019. We celebrated the opening of the new Calmar Medical Clinic Building and Leduc County's new Emergency Services Building.

With all the projects that we have completed and the ones that are on the books to begin, we need to talk taxes, as of course, that is how we pay for all our upgrades and services. I have heard far too often that taxes are too high in Calmar and people want to know what we receive for our taxes. In the last 8 years, taxes have increased by an average of 1.5 percent per year. With these increases remember that inflation has also increased at the same time by 1.5 to 2.5 percent per year, which means we are only raising taxes to cover the inflation rate increases!

For information, I have collected the 2018 tax rate of seven communities in the Capital Region area that are close in population size to Calmar for comparison:

### Mill Rate Taxes on a \$300,000 Home

Calmar	12.0623	\$3,618.69

Millet	10.2481	\$3,074.43

As you can see, the Town of Calmar is not the highest nor the lowest community for taxes. Something to remember when comparing towns' taxes is that not all communities provide the same services as Calmar for the tax dollars received. One example is the Town of Millet does not provide snow removal in the winter time. They only plow the snow to the side of the street, whereas Calmar plows the streets and removes all snow.

Some of the services that you receive from your tax dollars is as follows;

Arena, Parks and Recreation, Spray Park, Library, Community Cultural Centre, Communities in Blooms, Community & Family Programs, Family & Community Support Services, Community Policing, Fire Response & Prevention, Emergency & Disaster Recovery, Road & Sidewalk Maintenance, Street Sweeping & Snow Removal, Water & Sewer Services, Street Lights and Economic Development & Promotion.

All the people that are elected to Town Council are tax payers as well. When taxes are increased we are also increasing our own property taxes. We do not like to pay more taxes either, however as inflation goes up so does the need to increase taxes.

There are 2 main ways to keep taxes lower. We need to increase the number of residents and businesses in town or reduce services. Most tax payers would probably not be in favor of decreased services. Therefore, we need to find ways to increase our population, whether residentially or with business. I always ask myself how we can do this with all the negativity and complaints residents in our community partake in; running the town down drives new people and business away! Why would anyone want to come home to Calmar? We all need to show that our community is a warm and inviting place to call home and setup a business. Negativity does not achieve this goal. People need to know that our Town of Calmar has enormous potential and is a fantastic place to live! Spread the word of all the wonderful things our Town has to offer and leave the negativity alone. Don't participate in gossip and non-factual information! Ask questions of myself and Council. Just because you hear something on social media, in the coffee shop or in a business in Calmar does not make it true. Until information is confirmed by the Town or Council, it is merely hearsay!

As always, please contact me or anyone on Council if you have any questions. We like to hear from the residents and we want to answer your questions. We want our tax payers and community to be engaged with the things that go on in our Town. We want you to get involved and interested! We want to see you attend Council meetings on the first and third Mondays of the month and between 6:30 and 7:00 p.m. you can address all of Council and/or just have a chat before the regular council meeting begins. This promotes camaraderie with Council and Administration to make a person feel more comfortable to become involved. We are starting to prepare the necessary documentation for the annual audit to be conducted by MNP, LLP. Just a reminder that there is a 12% penalty levied, on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019, on all property taxes outstanding after December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2018.

### **Public Works/Development Ramblings**

Well 2018 is coming to an end and I can't really say it was an easy year to get things completed. From rain to snow to scheduling etc. it just seemed to be a struggle to get work completed. However we did get some Capital projects completed: the new cladding and insulation on the Mike Karbonik Arena; wheelchair accessible washrooms in the dressing rooms; the installation of the new condenser for the ice plant; the vestibule and wheelchair accessible entrance to the library; and of course the dreaded Parkview Crescent rehab which is half completed. The Parkview Crescent rehab was the real stickler this year, with a late start, poor weather conditions, scheduling of crews, staging of project to maintain access, it was all a challenge. With all the setbacks we did manage to get half completed and look forward to completing the project in 2019. We also had a new play structure installed in an all new location at the ball diamonds. This was well received by residents living on the south side of Highway 39 and we look forward to more improvements to the area. The winter has been forgiving other than the snowfall which came on the weekend of Dec 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup>, This proved to be quite a dump and after all was said and done there were approximately 298 loads of snow removed to our dump site as we put on approximately 2100Km between the 3 trucks, from town to dump site and back, over a period of 5 days. Quite remarkable really. Some projects which did not get completed is the lining of the sanitary line under Highway 39 from 47 street to 50 street, as well as the walkway adjacent to Highway 39 from Peace Park to 51 street. This is carried over to next year's budget. The completion of the new Leduc County Fire Station is a welcome addition to the Town of Calmar as well. It too is a very impressive building.

The Development end of things was quite slow in 2019 with no new subdivision development, other than 22 more lots being added to Southbridge. There was some residential development throughout Town with multi-family sites becoming very popular. The Development Department is working closely with Leduc County to create the Intermunicipal Development Plan as well as the Inter Collaborative Framework, both new requirements of The Municipal Government Act. The Town is also working to update our own Municipal Development Plan, as well as our Procedures and Design Standards for Development Document. The Land Use Bylaw was updated as well, however with the legalization of marijuana there will be many amendments required to allow for sales as well as manufacturing of the product.

Well that's about all I have for today. I would like to wish everyone a Very Merry Christmas, and all the best in the New Year.

And now, for something completely different.....

Family Day is still almost 2 months away but I am taking this opportunity to announce my first event/activity for Calmar – it's the Family Day Photo and Essay Contest!!

Because the purpose of Family Day is supposed to be for spending time with one's family, I felt it wouldn't be right to have a special event that would require workers/volunteers spend time away from their families as that would essentially be defeating the purpose of Family Day. So I decided I could help the community celebrate the holiday by having this contest where the prizes would benefit families. The top prizes would be an hour of ice time at the Mike Karbonik Arena. 

Different types of snowfalls require different methods of removal and determine the priority areas. On a typical snowfall as we saw at the beginning of December, lots of snow and no wind, drifting was not an issue therefore we would follow our snow removal policy. The grader will start on streets which can be winged off (snow not needing to be picked up), outside streets, etc., the loader will be used for intersections where cars need to stop and start, parking lots, etc. The skid steer and smaller equipment is used to clear walking paths, sidewalks etc. This allows businesses time to clear their sidewalks by pushing snow into the parking lane along the commercial areas. Crews typically start clearing the 50Ave (Hwy 39) at approximately 2:00 am – 3:00 am, this is done for safety reasons, as traffic is minimal, as well the parking lanes are clear. Once the Hwy is done we clear 50st (795) from 50 Ave to 47 Ave. Snow South of 47 Ave is winged off. Although Alberta Transportation plows the driving lane on these two streets the Town is responsible for removing the snow from parking lanes. When Hwy 39 and Sec. Hwy. 795 are clear, the next priority areas are schools and seniors living accommodations to ensure emergency vehicle access. From here we move to residential areas. Signs are placed out the night before snow removal in a given area so that vehicles can be moved off the street. Vehicles that remain on snow routes may be towed at the owners' expense. As indicated sometimes this priority list must change, if strong winds accompany snow storms crews may be focused on external routes where drifting occurs.

We thank you for your patience as clearing the entire Town takes approximately 5 days depending on conditions.


