Mayor's Corner

Another wonderful summer has come to an end and we are into Fall, which looks more like winter based on the snowfall we have had! Remember that our Annual Fall Clean Up runs from October 1st to the 5th. Please refer to the flyer, the Town website at <u>www.calmar.ca</u> or call the Town Office at (780) 985-3604 to find a list of items that can and cannot be picked up.

The sidewalk and repaving project on Parkview Crescent has been delayed because of weather and will not be completed until next year. The sidewalks and driveways that have been removed will be repaired and the roadway will be made available for the winter. The rest of the project will be completed next year. People have asked why we got such a late start on the project. The Town of Calmar receives Municipal Sustainability Initiative (MSI) Funding from the Provincial Government. We need to present the Government with the project and cost which require their approval. It is only after the approval that we can begin a project. If we choose to start the project before receiving approval, the Government can deem it unnecessary to fund the Town, which happened with a project many years ago, in which taxpayers had to fund the entire cost of that project. You can see why it is necessary to follow proper procedures! Does it make Council and Administration frustrated? It sure does, but we too have a set of rules by which we need to follow! Like everything in life, with a little patience and understanding the project will get completed and life will return to normal. I thank everyone for their patience and understanding!

Lately there has been a lot of talk about policing in Town. Council is still working on finding the most cost-effective way to deliver that service. It doesn't matter which choice our residents make, policing is going to require funding and could potentially mean our taxes will go up. It has been asked why the R.C.M.P. do not patrol at night? They do patrol in Calmar at night, however they cannot be in our community 24/7. Here is something to think about... The City of Leduc, Beaumont, Devon, Thorsby and Breton all have R.C.M.P. detachments in their communities. They all still have the same crime issues and problems that we have in Calmar. Is having a RCMP presence going to completely solve our crime problem? Absolutely not!

We need to do our own due diligence to secure our property, paying attention in our neighborhoods and reporting anything that does not look right! If you have the time to go on Facebook and complain, then you have time to call the RCMP to report the crime! The comment is the RCMP does not come anyway or they come three days later. If Calmar shows no crime reported, the RCMP Superiors will not patrol here because they have larger crime areas to patrol instead. A safe community is important to all of us and by working together we can achieve our goal! You can reach the Leduc RCMP detachment at (780) 980-7267 for non-emergency calls.

Many of you may have noticed the Mainstreet clock has been given a new life with completely new faces, it even seems to be keeping time now, finally. As you may have seen on our webpage the Parkview Crescent project will not get completed this year. If the weather cooperates our goal is to at least what is started completed then continue with Phase 2 works in spring.

On the Development end of things we completed the Handicap accessible vestibule on our library, which I feel is a huge face lift for the old structure plus makes the facility more user friendly. The Town is also updating our Municipal Development Plan, Intermunicipal Development Plan, and Intermunicipal Collaborative Framework all requirements of the Municipal Government Act. If anyone has questions on any of these please feel free to contact the office and speak with myself or Ruth Sider, our Development Officer. There will be open houses on these as well in the future to hear public input regarding the future of the Town of Calmar.

It is also Budget Time in our world so everyone is busy putting together their wish list of goals and requirements for the upcoming season. This is always an interesting time realizing the cost to run even a small municipality like ours.

Well that's about it for now, Please do not forget "FALL CLEANUP" the first week of October, and I wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving.

This year, Christmas in the Park has been moved up to 29 November. While this may seem early for some people, there are some good reasons for doing so. First, in discussions with Mayor Yachimetz, he mentioned Christmas in the Park would be a good time for the Town to officially turn on its Xmas lights and to kick off the Christmas season in Calmar. Many communities often kick off their Xmas season in a similar way, often with a Santa Claus Parade. Liking this idea, it was felt that waiting until December makes the Town look a bit 'grinchy' in not turning on its decorations sooner so just like many Santa Claus parades, it was decided to bump things to November. In an attempt to make Christmas in the Park a truly community event, the Recreation Board would like to see more volunteer involvement. CMHA Alberta Division invites community members to share the realities of living with mental health issues during Mental Illness Awareness Week (MIAW), the first full week of October.

MIAW is an annual national public education campaign coordinated by the Canadian Alliance on Mental Illness and Mental Health (CAMIMH). CAMIMH's mandate is to ensure that mental illness and mental health are placed on the national agenda so that Canadians receive appropriate access to care and support.

CMHA is an active member of CAMIMH and is proud to support its annual Faces of Mental Illness campaign during MIAW. This year's MIAW theme is Spreading Awareness, Reducing Stigma. As one in five Canadians live with mental health issues, the campaign encourages Canadians to share their personal stories about stigma and how it negatively affects them in their personal life, in the workplace, or in their community.

CMHA recognizes that there are many different types of mental illness that affect people in different ways. Within each mental illness, people may have very different symptoms and challenges. In addition, symptoms of mental illness are just one piece. Access to services, support from loved ones, and the ability to participate in communities play a big part in the way people experience mental illnesses.

CMHA partnered with CAMIMH on the development of its "Mental Health Now" policy document which urges investments in mental health for all Canadians. Along with other CAMIMH members, CMHA will be very active in meetings with Ministers and Members of Parliament during the upcoming Health Accord meetings.



WHAT IS THANKSGIVING

A lot of people think that the holiday is just a Canadian version of American Thanksgiving, but the Canadian celebration actually happened 40 years before the American pilgrims had their dinner. In 1578 the British explorer, and occasional pirate, Martin Frobisher held a feast of thanksgiving in Newfoundland. Frobisher was giving thanks that he and, well, most of his crew had come back from a rough trip through the Arctic looking for the Northwest Passage. After storms and cold and getting lost, Frobisher was sorry he hadn't found the Passage but very happy to be alive. This meal likely wasn't too tasty, coming out of ships' storage and tin cans, but it started a tradition of being grateful for what food they had.

From 1606 onwards, Samuel de Champlain followed the custom of First Nations harvest festivals and held feasts in the colony of New France attended by French settlers and local Mi'kmaq people. Official celebrations of Thanksgiving moved around a lot – once the day was held in the spring in 1816 to celebrate the end of a war between Britain and France – before becoming an annual Canadian holiday in 1879. Even then it was usually held in the first week of November, often celebrated along with Remembrance Day from the 1920s on-wards. Finally in 1957, Parliament settled on making Thanksgiving officially happen every year on the second Monday in October.
