Some facts about Remembrance Day; November 11:

 Remembrance Day was first observed in 1919 throughout the British Commonwealth. It was originally called "Armistice Day" to commemorate armistice agreement that ended the First World War on Monday, November 11, 1918, at 11 a.m.—on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

2. From 1921 to 1930, Armistice Day was held on the Monday of the week in which November 11 fell. In 1931, Alan Neill, Member of Parliament for Comox-Alberni, introduced a bill to observe Armistice Day only on November 11. Passed by the House of Commons, the bill also changed the name to "Remembrance Day". The first Remembrance Day was observed on November 11, 1931.

3. Every year on November 11, Canadians pause in a moment of silence to honour and remember the men and women who have served, and continue to serve Canada during times of war, conflict and peace. We remember the more than 2,300,000 Canadians who have served throughout our nation's history and the more than 118,000 who made the ultimate sacrifice.

PEACE OFFICER'S CORNER

Hello everyone

Please note that I have stopped many vehicles for the infractions (below) and do so as most drivers do not understand either the dangers or it is an offence. As I have said in the past, my first priority is to educate. I will continue to educate in these and other areas.

First, Mudguards :

Mudguards VER Section 64

(1) A motor vehicle or trailer must have a part of its body, a fender or a mudguard that covers the width of each tire.

(2) The body part, fender or mudguard referred to in subsection (1) must be above each wheel and (a) extend downwards at the rear of each axle or axle group to at least the centre line of the axle, or (b) be a distance away from the ground equivalent to at least 1/3 of the horizontal distance from the bottom edge of the mudguard to the centre line of the axle, but not closer to the ground than 150 millimetres when the vehicle is loaded.

(4) A passenger car is not required to have a mudguard.

(5) This section does not apply to a trailer designed and constructed for drive-on and drive-off low loads.

A vehicle which is required to have mud flaps presents a serious danger to the vehicles behind while driving. Rocks debris, slush, water, or other materials can be splashed or shot onto the front windshield of a rear approaching vehicle. Spring, Fall, and Winter and the high seasons for this sort of danger due to the road conditions and material being sprayed on our roadways to better the road conditions. TO DATE I HAVE ISSUED 1 MUDFLAP TICKET.

Second, window glazing (Tinting) :

VER Section 70

(1) A person shall not install, replace or cover the window glazing in a windshield or in a left or right side window of a motor vehicle that is beside or forward of the driver with a transparent, translucent or opaque material.

(2) A person shall not install, replace or cover the rear window glazing in a motor vehicle with a transparent, translucent or opaque material unless the motor vehicle has outside rear view mirrors on both the left and right that comply with section 74(2). Section 74(2) If the view in the rear view mirror is obstructed or interfered with in any way, a motor vehicle must have side mirrors on each side that give the driver a clear view of the roadway behind and on each side of the motor vehicle.

Tinting of the windows beside the driver/front passenger/front windshield, limits your ability to see, thru to side mirrors/shoulder checks/or roadway. This is especially dangerous at night when street lighting/vehicle lights, reflect off the glazing, which may dramatically limit the drivers visibility. TO DATE I HAVE WRITTEN 1 TINTED WINDOW TICKET.

Also a reminder that with snow approaching our graders and plows will be out cleaning streets. When the snow clearing signs go up, remember to move your vehicle to allow our machines to provide everyone with a clear roadway and front parking area. Keep in mind that vehicles left on a roadway that prevent street cleaning will be towed at the owners' expense as well as any storage costs

Ending on a positive note. Halloween is fast approaching. I hope all those who are out that night enjoy their evening and have a safe night!

Today, there are 11 million Canadians living with diabetes or prediabetes. Every three minutes, another Canadian is diagnosed. Chances are that diabetes affects you or someone you know.

What is diabetes?

Diabetes is a chronic, often debilitating and sometimes fatal disease, in which the body either cannot produce insulin or cannot properly use the insulin it produces. Insulin is a hormone that controls the amount of glucose (sugar) in the blood. Diabetes leads to high blood sugar levels, which can damage organs, blood vessels and nerves. The body needs insulin to use sugar as an energy source.

Test your risk for Type 2 diabetes annually.

1 in 3 Canadians has diabetes or prediabetes. Many don't know it.

There are many signs and symptoms that can indicate diabetes. Signs and symptoms can include the following:

- Unusual thirst
- Frequent urination
- Weight change (gain or loss)
- Extreme fatigue or lack of energy
- Blurred vision
- Frequent or recurring infections
- Cuts and bruises that are slow to heal
- Tingling or numbness in the hands or feet




