Mayor's Corner





Greetings from the Town of Calmar! We are wishing everyone a fun and safe Halloween! Just a reminder that November is upon us and that Remembrance Day ceremonies will be held at the Calmar Legion beginning at 10 a.m. Please come out and remember and honor our Veterans for the many sacrifices they have made on our behalf! We thank all Veterans for the peace and freedom we all enjoy and should never take for granted! We also thank all Emergency Fire, Ambulance and Police/Peace Officers for their contributions to helping us in our times of need.

The Town of Calmar and Leduc County have finally come to an agreement after nine months of negotiations. Leduc County will provide Emergency Services for the residents of the Town of Calmar and Leduc County. Leduc County will be building a new Fire Hall on the east side of 50st. between 45th and 46th Ave. This land was sold to the County at a cost of \$250,000.00, which is the same price that the Town purchased it for. The Town is also selling the Town's Rescue Truck and all rescue equipment for \$55,000.00. The Chief's command unit is being sold for \$46,000.00. The Town will be donating all equipment in the Fire Hall; (air compressor, self-contained breathing apparatus, turnout gear (fire fighters suits), and miscellaneous equipment) to Leduc County at a cost of approximately \$68,000.00. The Town's pump apparatus and its equipment will be sold to another buyer for approximately \$355,000.00.

The Town will pay Leduc County \$20,000.00 per year to look after its Disaster Services Plan. This plan is mandatory by law as per the Provincial Government. The Town will make a one time payment of \$20,000.00 to setup the Disaster Service Command Center in the Fire Hall. We will also pay a fee for service of \$2,850.00 per emergency call out. The last four years the Town has averaged fifty three (53) calls per year. That is a total of \$151,050.00 per year. The new contract will be for five years with an increase each year to the fee for service of the Federal Cost of Living increase (or inflation).

The Town of Calmar could have continued to provide the Residents Emergency Services for a budgeted amount of \$350,000.00 per year and retained \$800,000.00 in assets. We would have had to build a new Fire Hall costing some where between 1 and 1.5 million dollars. All of this could have been done with no tax increase to the Residents. The contract is to begin January 1, 2017.

Calmar Minor Hockey Looking for Officials

Our community is full of people that have a good knowledge of hockey, and we need those skills on the ice. Cancelling games, due to lack of officials, can be a reality in minor hockey organizations in our area. To avoid this, we need to build our pool of referees.

Last year, Calmar had two local officials to draw from, both of which were youth. Most of the youth officials also played hockey and are limited to the number of games they could officiate. Using these two referees, there were four local teams to assign referees and a numerous amount of games that did not involve a Calmar team. When possible we worked with some of the ref assignors from neighbouring communities to bring in "out of town" referees to fill holes in the schedule, only when local officials were not available. Just as a frame of reference, a ref assignor from a community near us assigned for ten teams in his community last season and had a list of 40 local officials to choose.

As the number of officials are dropping everywhere, it is becoming increasingly harder to find reliable people from outside the community to fill the gaps and give our teams a good variety of different officials for their games. To keep using other community's officials, and maintain healthy relationships with other minor hockey organizations and referee assignors, we also must be willing to send our officials to these other communities when needed.

Looking forward to the 2016/2017 season, there are four local teams in the Calmar minor hockey organization while having up to three outside minor hockey organizations utilize our facilities. We are going to be in desperate need of more adult and youth officials to help fill these games.

All new referees, young and old, move up at their pace and according to their comfort level.

- Pay
 - This is the benefit that officials of all levels enjoy most. Although it is not all about the money, youth hockey can pay very well.
- Opportunities for advancement
 - Yes, it is going to be hard and not every single referee will make it to the higher levels of hockey.
 However, if you put in the effort and are consistent every single game that you work, people will notice and begin asking you to do higher level games.
- Officiating allows your knowledge of the game to grow
 - If you are already a coach or player, you obviously have a serious interest in the game. Becoming a referee allows you to expand your knowledge of the rules and see the game from a different perspective, one which does not favor either side.
- Extra Ice-Time
 - You hear it on every team, parents and players arguing with coaches about the lack of ice time they or their child is getting.
- Exercise
 - This benefit is becoming more and more popular as the cost of gym memberships are constantly increasing.
- It is an opportunity to give back to the game you love.
 - As an ice hockey referee, you will have the opportunity to teach and educate players of all age groups the proper way to play hockey.

If you have ever considered becoming a referee, we challenge you to pursue that goal this upcoming season. Not only will you be able to get out on the ice more often, but you will also have the opportunity to see the game through an entirely different perspective.


