

# **Breast cancer statistics**

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among Canadian women (excluding non-melanoma skin cancers). It is the 2nd leading cause of death from cancer in Canadian women. Breast cancer can also occur in men, but it is not common.

# **Incidence and mortality**

Incidence is the number of new cases of cancer. Mortality is the number of deaths due to cancer. The following incidence and mortality statistics are estimated using the most up-to-date actual data available.

It is estimated that in 2017:

- 26,300 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer. This represents 25% of all new cancer cases in women in 2017.
- 5,000 women will die from breast cancer. This represents 13% of all cancer deaths in women in 2017.
- On average, 72 Canadian women will be diagnosed with breast cancer every day.
- On average, 14 Canadian women will die from breast cancer every day.
- 230 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer and 60 will die from breast cancer.

It will be expensive for some, as I have pulled cars over from 20 to 30kph over the posted 50kph speed signs.



I would like to further state that **ABUSING** an animal is also **AN OFFENCE WHICH GIVES ME THE AUTHORITY TO SEIZE THE ANI-MAL** to protect it from further harm. SPCA could also be called in to further investigate, with more possible fines and charges pending. The **FULL WEIGHT** of the law and my authority will be used for any fines and/or charges that apply to this type of action.

In getting ready for the winter season, I also would like to give lots of notice that when the town grader is clearing snow along the roadways and grading signs were posted the night before, I will be calling two tow trucks to follow our grader and remove vehicles (at owners cost) that the vehicle owners have chosen to disregard the no parking restriction. It is unfair to town residence who abide by this grading ban and have the offending vehicles park in the cleared areas as the offending vehicles areas could not be cleared.

Leaving things on a Positive note, I would like to thank the Town Citizens who have taken the time to either call or approach me with issues occurring in their community. It has allowed me to resolve disputes or conditions that can be settled at spark level before it becomes a forest fire. My goals have remained the same since the first day I have started. ### Stay Secure while Trick or Treating

Always examine the treats and toys that are brought home before giving them to your children.

- Tell your children not to eat any treats until you have looked them over.
- Be careful when giving children any treats that could be potential choking hazards such as chewy candies, peanuts and hard candies.
- Check toys or novelty items for small parts and do not let children under three years of age play with them.

### Be Cautious with Candy and Toys

Keep your children safe by teaching them to stay visible and to be aware of their surroundings.

- Go trick or treating with your children each year until they are old enough to go with a friend.
- Give each child a flashlight to carry, to make them more visible to motorists and others.
- Tell your children to stay in well-lit areas and only visit homes that have their outside lights turned on. Make sure they know never to go inside homes or cars.
- Teach your children to be careful when crossing the street. Make sure they look both ways and only cross when no cars are coming. Cross streets at the corner, and never cross between parked cars.

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### VOTER IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

Proof of identity and current residence is now required to be able to vote in municipal elections. Any of the following documents that has your name and address on it will be accepted as valid proof:

- Photo identification issued by a Canadian government or agency, whether federal, provincial or local;
- Bank/credit card statement or personal cheque;
- Correspondence issued by a school, college or university;
- Government cheque or cheque stub;
- Income/property tax assessment notice;
- Insurance policy or coverage card;
- Letter from a public curator, public guardian or public trustee;
- Pension Plan statement of benefits, contributions or participation;
- Residential lease or mortgage statement;
- Statement of government benefits: e.g. Employment insurance, old-age security, social assistance, disability support, or child tax benefit;
- Utility bill: e.g. Telephone, public utilities commission, television, electricity, gas or water;
- Vehicle ownership, registration or insurance certificate; or
- A letter or form (attestation) confirming that the person lives at the stated address. The letter can be signed by any of the following:
  - authorized representative of a commercial property management company;
  - authorized representative of a correctional institution;
  - authorized representative of a First Nations band or reserve;
  - authorized representative of a post-secondary institution;
  - authorized representative of a facility that provides services to the homeless; or
  - authorized representative of a supportive living facility or treatment centre;

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### What if I don't have any photo ID like a driver's license?

- It doesn't matter. Just bring anything else you have from the above list that has your name and address on it.
- Do I need more than one document?
  - No, only one document with your name and address is needed. \*

#### What if all of my documents have a post office box address?

 That is ok. As long as it makes sense that a person in your voting subdivision or ward would have a post office box at your mailing address, it will be accepted. The post office box doesn't have to be in your voting subdivision or ward – just reasonably close by.

#### I used to have to sign a form to say that I am eligible. Do I still have to sign that form?

 Yes, you will still have to sign the Statement of Elector Eligibility as well as provide one of the above documents that contains your name and address.

#### What if I don't have any accounts or documents in my own name?

 Have your landlord, facility, or organization manager sign a letter or form (attestation) to confirm your address, and bring it with you to the voting station. Your municipality may have a form that you can use, so check with them. You will have to do this before you come to vote, so plan ahead.

\* These are the basic requirements for all Alberta municipalities. Your local municipality may have additional requirements or accept additional types of ID. Please check with them.



How our program works:

We rent gently used and sometimes new gowns for a rental fee of \$65. A refundable deposit of \$100 is required. This deposit is used for stain removal or repairs that may be needed before another student can rent it. If there is no excessive damage, the deposit is returned once the gown is brought back to us.

We truly believe every student should be able to participate in their graduation. They should not be left out due to lack of money to purchase a dress. If finances are an issue, we ask that you still come and talk to us and we will work with you to ensure that you have the gown of your dreams! We have a strict privacy policy and your information is not shared with anyone.

# Calmar Minor Hockey Looking for Officials

Our community is full of people that have a good knowledge of hockey, and we need those skills on the ice. Cancelling games, due to lack of officials, can be a reality in minor hockey organizations in our area. To avoid this, we need to build our pool of referees. Last year, Calmar had a few local officials to draw from. Most of the youth officials also played hockey and are limited to the number of games they could officiate. Using these two referees, there were four local teams to assign referees and a numerous amount of games that did not involve a Calmar team. When possible we worked with some of the ref assignors from neighbouring communities to bring in "out of town" referees to fill holes in the schedule, only when local officials were not available. Just as a frame of reference, a ref assignor from a community near us assigned for ten teams in his community last season and had a list of 40 local officials to choose.

As the number of officials are dropping everywhere, it is becoming increasingly harder to find reliable people from outside the community to fill the gaps and give our teams a good variety of different officials for their games. To keep using other community's officials, and maintain healthy relationships with other minor hockey organizations and referee assignors, we also must be willing to send our officials to these other communities when needed.

Looking forward to the 2017/2018 season, there are four local teams in the Calmar minor hockey organization while having up to three outside minor hockey organizations utilize our facilities. We are going to be in desperate need of more adult and youth officials to help fill these games.

All new referees, young and old, move up at their pace and according to their comfort level.

Benefits that all Ice Hockey Referees Experience

- Pay
  - This is the benefit that officials of all levels enjoy most. Although it is not all about the money, youth hockey can pay very well.
- Opportunities for advancement
  - Yes, it is going to be hard and not every single referee will make it to the higher levels of hockey. However, if you
    put in the effort and are consistent every single game that you work, people will notice and begin asking you to do
    higher level games.
- Officiating allows your knowledge of the game to grow
  - If you are already a coach or player, you obviously have a serious interest in the game. Becoming a referee allows you to expand your knowledge of the rules and see the game from a different perspective, one which does not favor either side.
- Extra Ice-Time
  - You hear it on every team, parents and players arguing with coaches about the lack of ice time they or their child is getting.
- Exercise
  - This benefit is becoming more and more popular as the cost of gym memberships are constantly increasing.
- It is an opportunity to give back to the game you love.
  - As an ice hockey referee, you will have the opportunity to teach and educate players of all age groups the proper way to play hockey.
